BEAR RIVER HERITAGE AREA

Blessed by Water, Worked by Hand

Before the advent of white settlers, Box Elder was home to Northwestern Shoshone Indians whose families followed seasonal systems of subsistence along the eastern and northern shores of the Great Salt Lake. In the 19th Century, Mormons and other immigrants established routes and settlements, and with the advent of the railroad, small towns cropped up. This self-guided tour directs you to historical sites and attractions of Box Elder County, Utah and parts of neighboring Cassia County, Idaho. Allow three days for the tour, and plan ahead for safety in travel on back roads in the Great Basin desert terrain.

PART ONE: EXPERIENCE & LEARN

Distance and Time: ~160 miles, one day

Communities: Brigham City, Willard/Perry, small towns along UT Hwy 38, Tremonton, Bothwell, Corinne, and Promontory. Beginning in the town of Brigham City, the tour includes educational and historical sites that will prepare you to understand the history and natural resources of the region. **Information**: boxeldercounty.org; nwbshoshone.com; visitbrighamcity.com

Bear River Migratory Bird Refuge

A wetland created by the flow of the Bear River into the northeast arm of the Great Salt Lake. The marshes are the largest freshwater component of the Great Salt Lake ecosystem. Educational exhibits and programing, auto tour, bird watching, and photography.

Historic Fruitway


Spiral letty

Location: 41.4377° N, -112.6689° W; Follow the signs from Golden Spike NHS.



PART TWO: RAILS, TRAILS & GHOST TOWNS

Distance and Time: ~125 miles, one day

Communities: Snowville, Park Valley, Rosette For travelers looking for an adventurous back-roads route, State Hwy 30 through the Great Basin desert back-roads provides plenty of intrigue. Skirting the north shore of the Great Salt Lake, these roads will take you past remote ranches, ghost towns and cemeteries, railroad beds, and wide open vistas over desert terrain.

Directions: From I-84, take Snowville Exit 5. Head West on State Hwy 30 for ~15.5 miles. Turn south at the State Hwy 42/30 Junction to continue on State Hwy 30. The tour begins here.

Town of Snowville, founded 1871

Located about three miles south of the Idaho border, Snowville is the center of farming and dairying activities in the Curlew Valley. Travelers can dine at Mollie's Café or the Ranch House diner. Location: Snowville Exit 7 from US I-84 Information: boxeldercounty.org

Ranch Sites

Western Box Elder County is most suited for ranching, as is evident by the many uniquely named ranch sites. **Information**: USU Ranch Family Documentation Project, digital.lib.usu.edu; 435.797.8248

Ghost Towns and Cemeteries

Several towns sprang up along the lines of the Transcontinental Railroad, but were abandoned when the Lucin cut-off bypassed the old route in 1904.

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Birding

Birding opportunities are all along the tour with prime areas at Kelton, Locomotive Springs, Terrace, Lucin (specifically at the pond), and Rabbit Spring (a small reservoir). Look for common and spring migrant songbirds, Northern saw-whet owls, and a variety of raptors along power lines.

Hunting and Fishing

Small and big game, upland game, waterfowl, and a variety of fish are each found within the region, with hunting allowed in certain areas. Licenses are required for both hunting and fishing.

Overland Routes

Many routes and trails passed through this region, including the Transcontinental railroad, immigrant trails, and stock trails. Original railroad rails were removed during WWII, but some trestles and almost 90 miles of historic grade still exist. The Oregon California Trail brought over 500,000 pioneers travelling through this region on their way to points

Center Point

Center Point is the name given to one of the most visible wagon freight routes delivering goods from Kelton to points west in the late 1800s to early 1900s. Location: Freight wagon roads running out from Kelton can be viewed by looking south from the point

Devil's Playground

Comprised of BLM and state land, this location is full of interesting rock formations and is a good site for OHV riding and camping. BLM lands are public but expect to see "No Trespassing" signs as government and private lands often intersect.

Sun Tunnels

Created by artist Nancy Holt in 1976, this radical creation, along with the Spiral Jetty, is part of the land art collection of the Dia Art Foundation. Located in an unlikely and remote location, one experiences only by visiting why this is the perfect location.








PART THREE: GROUSE CREEK TO CITY OF **ROCKS NATIONAL RESERVE**

Distance and Time: ~150 miles, one day

Communities: Grouse Creek, Yost, Lynn, Almo, Standrod, Naf. Strevell

Continuing north from Lucin, visitors will travel a loop through remote ranching communities to City of Rocks National Reserve and City of Rocks Scenic Byway. Local attractions include hiking, birding, horseback riding, hunting and fishing; historic architecture, and cultural celebrations such as rodeos and 4th of July celebrations.

Historic Architecture

In Grouse Creek and the surrounding communities, look for early log structures, and small barns, which were used to protect stock animals in ranching communities. For an interesting hike, you can find the sandstone quarry at the center of Grouse Creek and see the natural materials used for buildings such as the Grouse Creek School, the Mormon tithing house near the red brick Tanner house, and the Etna schoolhouse found on the Etna Road loop, and others. **Information**: For further learning see The Grouse Creek Cultural Survey by Thomas Carter and Carl Fleischhauer, 1988, digital.lib.usu.edu/cdm/landingpage/ collection/Grouse
